# **Developing a Strategy for Communication and Outreach**

Dear Church Family,

In recent conversations I have had with members, interest has been expressed in our church's strategy for communication and outreach. For the sake of generating discussion, feedback, and support, I want to share with you the goals our Communications Ministry has for this year along with some of my own thoughts.

If resources allow, the goals for the Communications Ministry include:

- 1) Posting videos on our church's website that might potentially feature church members talking about our church and why they are a part of it.
- 2) Sending postcards to a targeted mailing list of homes in the community as a way of promoting a month of visitor-friendly activities at our church. Such activities would include a special four-week worship series, a fun community event for families, and an adult education series. - 3) Placing a sign for our church on the corner of Highway 99 and 68<sup>th</sup> Street.
- 4) Utilizing a mailing service that would allow us to send an introductory brochure about our church to homebuyers in Vancouver. This is a common strategy among churches seeking to attract new residents who are looking for a church home.

As I indicated in my sermon on Sunday, I am also interested in developing an outreach program at church that involves members interacting with people in the general public. My example on Sunday was to have a table at the Vancouver Farmer's Market that would allow us to practice "reverse evangelism." Instead of telling people what we think they should believe, we would invite them to tell us something about themselves. For example, we might ask them to tell us the story of the most meaningful moment in their life. We could even record the story and provide them with a free copy.

Finally, one of the best ways to bring people into one's church is word of mouth. If you share with others what you love about our church, you may well find that some of them desire to have the same sense of spiritual community and connection in their lives that you have.

A good strategy of communication and outreach for a church requires the input and participation of its members. We need your help in spreading the word!

The "Drink Water for Life" idea originated as a Lenten observance of the 1<sup>st</sup> Congregational United Church of Christ in Salem, Oregon, which is committed to serving the poorest of the poor by funding community water and sanitation projects. The idea is simple: covenant to "give up" all pricey beverages during Lent (lattes, soda, etc), and drink water instead. Then donate all the money you have saved to a water project (wells, purification, etc) in a needy part of the world. Salem's first year of the project raised \$3,500. Since then, their idea has spread to other churches, high schools, and universities.
