Last week I attended a grief counseling training at The Center for Loss and Life Transition in Fort Collins, Colorado. It was an emotionally demanding week as I and 23 other students practiced our newly acquired skills on each other in mock counseling sessions. When it was all over, I spent a day in Denver with my family before flying home. Along with two other families with children,we visited Denver's Downtown Aquarium. Of the more than 500 species of animals at the aquarium, what sticks out most vividly in my memory isn't the shark tank or the tiger prowling next to pools of water. It is a fish tank packed with relatively small, brightly colored fish swimming in a myriad of different directions.

For reasons upon which it is hard to place a finger, the sight of these fish filled me with a sublime happiness. Perhaps, after a week of thinking about death, these fish gave me a renewed appreciation of life. In that moment, they represented for me joy and vitality in abundance.



I offer this image of a tank full of teeming fish now as an image to spur reflection. Imagine that each of the fish in this tank represents something in your life for which you are thankful. Take a moment to not only feel gratitude for the individual fish before you but also for the tank as a whole. Let yourself experience an abundance of appreciative joy. You may then find yourself offering up a prayer of thanksgiving for a life packed with blessings.

I Will Vote for Option One

At the Congregational meeting scheduled for Sunday, November 18th, I will cast my vote in favor of aggressively paying down the mortgage, Option One.

As mentioned in the end-of-October Link Special Edition about the upcoming meeting, I have been looking into the history of the Skylight project financing, the current situation and what the future might hold based on how we approach paying off the mortgage. I am convinced that we cannot afford to treat the church's mortgage the same way we treat our home mortgages. Aside from the sheer size of the mortgage the two main distinctions are the wastefulness of paying interest and the source of income to make payments.

Interest

Homeowners receive a home mortgage interest deduction against their income which means that the government helps pay a portion of the interest by reducing taxes. The church, however, pays no taxes and can receive no benefit. Every dollar we spend in interest payments is a dollar we raised in a capital campaign or an annual budget pledge that does NOT help reduce our debt. From our perspective, it is simply wasted.

In June, 2011, we started making the expected mortgage payments of \$5097.77 each month. When I began looking into the mortgage in September we had made 15 monthly payments from our capital campaign funds totaling **\$76,467**. At the end of those 15 payments we had reduced our debt by only **\$10,932**. This ratio, \$10,932 of benefit at a cost of \$76,467, is what I refer to as our **payment efficiency**. During this period it was **14.3%**. The strategy of making only minimal payments resulted in spending **85.7%** of our funds on interest. We continued to make minimum payments in September, October and November.

The only way to make the funds we contribute more efficient in paying off the mortgage is to make regular, large additional principal payments each month. It is particularly advantageous to make a very large extra payment just before refinancing the loan as planned in Option One.

Income

Every dollar we use to pay for the mortgage, which paid for the Skylight project, comes to the church through our voluntary giving to capital campaigns or to the annual budget. I want to see us choose to use these funds wisely. While we are currently in the stewardship season for next year's operating budget, we need to remember that stewardship addresses both the use of our personal gifts to support the church as well as the church making every effort to use our contributions to their best effect.

My desire to see our contributions used most effectively for the job at hand, paying off the principal balance of our mortgage, drives me to support Option One and the follow-on efforts to develop a complete plan that will get us all the way to a paid-off mortgage as quickly as feasible.

Cornerstone

In closing I want to make it clear that without The Cornerstone Fund we might never have been able to carry out the Skylight project. Commercial lenders were not and probably are still not anxious to lend money to churches, nor would they have become partners in this work as we have found Cornerstone to be.

The beauty and esthetics of our sanctuary continues to be an important part of who we are as a church. Many church members who attended the Marriage Equality celebration on November 7th have passed on comments from community members who felt welcomed and at peace in our sanctuary. It is part of our outreach.

I do not begrudge the interest we pay to The Cornerstone Fund because their mission is to use those funds to help other churches in the same way we have been helped. However, from **our** perspective, I don't want to spend any more on interest than is absolutely unavoidable. Even with very aggressive payback plans, efficiencies level out at about 75%-80%. Our goal is to pay back the principal that made our project possible. Good stewardship, I believe, calls for us to do so in the most efficient manner possible.

I am open to questions and comments about my position and am willing to share the reports and presentations I have put together about this topic.

It's that time of year when we are asked to reach deep into our pockets to support the operation of our precious church. This church has supported me at the lowest time in my life, allowing me to carry on with my head held up. (I am sure the congregation is aware of that stc Then this past year the church gave me another unexpected gift---the opportunity to thank the person who forever changed my life.

About 6 months after my husband's death in 1992, my walking started to deteriorate. I could no longer hide that my MS was in charge of my life. I went to a drugstore and to buy a beautiful, carved, exotic cane so I would look eccentric not handicapped, but all they had were ugly canes one of which I was forced to buy. Well, my doctor thought the cane wasn't quite right and sent me to a physical therapist at the old Bess Kaiser Hospital. There, this wonderful young enthusiastic lady PT, after putting through my paces (torture), agreed that I needed walking assistance. I told her about my wanting to look exotic not crippled. She said, "I'll show you what you need." She went to a closet and pulled out two old arm crutches!! She noticed my reluctance and she took my hands and with the warmest smile said "Now, Joy," and she lectured me that adapting to life is what takes the "dis" out of the word disability. She said, "These two canes will keep you upright and steady. Come on try 'em, you'll like 'em!" So I did and she was right. It was easier to move with two arm crutches. I could stop and talk to someone without having to put aside my cane. I could continue to express myself with my hands. (You've probably noticed, I can't talk without my hands in motion!) She then asked what color, so I chose pink, and two days later I walked out of that hospital with the confidence that I could face anything MS handed me. I never saw that woman again until------

A couple of months ago I was cleaning out my files. I was going through my health files when a business card fluttered to the floor. I picked it up and read the name and realized it was the card for the PT who so inspired me. I read the name again—Lynn Renner. Could it be the same Lynn Renner from church? I had heard her presentation on her travels to Asia and I remembered her saying she was a physical therapist. Sure enough, she was the physical therapist who had changed my life. After 20 years, I was finally able to thank her personally and give her a big hug for helping me realize if I was disabled it was because I did not have the right adaptive mind set !

I know I was blessed that God crossed our life journe paths so many years ago and again today so I can personally say "Thank you, Angel Lynn Renner, for saving the quality of my life!"

Because of the support and opportunity this church has given me, I will always tithe as much as I am able to support the operation of this precious church.
